And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account.

Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" And the disciples were perplexed at these words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were greatly astounded and said to one another, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible."

Peter began to say to him, "Look, we have left everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age—houses, brothers and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with persecutions—and in the age to come eternal life. 

Music Notes, by Ray Urwin



Today's Offertory anthem and Communion music were written by Samuel Wesley, a child prodigy as both a keyboard player and composer who some called "the English Mozart." He was a nephew of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, the son of the hymn writer Charles Wesley (who by coincidence wrote the words of today's final hymn), and the father of Samuel Sebastian Wesley, who wrote seven hymns in our hymnal, including "The Church's one Foundation." Samuel *père* was a major force in introducing Bach's music to the British public, and named his son Sebastian in honor of Bach. Louis Vierne (Prelude) was for many years the renowned and blind organist of Notre Dame. He died of a stroke while at the console giving what was supposed to be the final organ recital there (his page tuner and assistant was the composer Maurice Duruflé). *Communion* is in the quintessentially French musical style of the era.

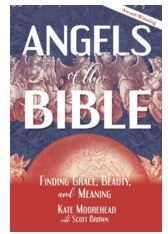

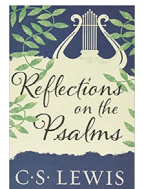
