Maundy Thursday April 17, 2025 * 7:00 pm



On this very night, the night He was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ, loving those who were His own in the world even to the end, offered His Body and Blood for the first time.

This service is, first of all, the memorial of the institution of the Holy Eucharist, that is of the memorial of the Last Supper.

On this night, when 'Christ our paschal lamb was sacrificed', what had long been promised in signs and figures was at last revealed and brought to fulfillment. The true Lamb replaced the symbolic lamb, and the many offerings of the past gave way to the single sacrifice of Christ.

The Liturgy begins in a spirit of joy and festivity, and then slowly changes to a more solemn tone which will continue until the Great Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night.

The three days of the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday) are one long continuing service; Therefore, there is no ending, no final blessing, nor a dismissal for this service.

Reader A Reading from the book of Exodus.

¹The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: ²This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. ⁴If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. ¹¹This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. ¹²For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. ¹³The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

¹⁴This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

²³I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, ²⁴and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁵In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

THE GOSPEL: John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Rector+ The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

¹Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ³Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ⁷Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ⁶Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ⁹Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." ¹¹For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

^{31b}"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

May the grace and power of your Holy Spirit fill every member, so that we may together bear witness for you on the earth. If it be good in your sight, heal the outward divisions of your people, disposing the wills of all to a true union in the Truth.

Intercessor Let us pray for all rulers and leaders around the world:

May your Holy Spirit, O God, rest upon all who bear great responsibilities for government among the nations. Teach them to seek your will. When they turn to you for guidance, let your way be plain to them; and when they do not seek you, overrule their decisions for the good of all your children and the honor of your kingdom.

Lord, in your mercy:

All Hear our prayer.

Intercessor Let us pray for all those who are not with us this night – for our absent friends and relatives – and for those who feel they have been cut off from your Church:

O Lord Jesus Christ, who on this night washed your disciples' feet, leaving us an example of humble service: Grant that our souls may be washed from all defilement; grant us - and all your children – the courage to forgive; and grant that we fail not to serve you in the least of our brethren.

Intercessor Let us pray for all those who are sick or suffering in any way – those known to us, and those un-known to us, remembering especially all those who have asked us to pray for them:

O Savior of the world, who in Gethsemane accepted the bitter cup in submission to your Father's will; Look mercifully upon our weak and wayward lives, and arm us with such strength and courage that we may tread without fear with the crosses we have to carry.




The Eucharistic Prayer D



It is truly right to glorify you, Father, and to give you thanks; for you alone are God, living and true, dwelling in light inaccessible from before time and for ever.

Fountain of life and source of all goodness, you made all things and fill them with your blessing; you created them to rejoice in the splendor of your radiance.

Countless throngs of angels stand before you to serve you night and day; and, beholding the glory of your presence, they offer you unceasing praise. Joining with them, and giving voice to every creature under heaven, we acclaim you, and glorify your Name, as we sing:

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation. Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, He lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor He proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose He gave Himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for Him who died and rose for us, He sent the Holy Spirit, His own first gift for those who believe, to complete His work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for Him to be glorified by you, His heavenly Father, having loved His own who were in the world, He loved them to the end; at supper with them He took bread in His holy and venerable hands, and when He had given thanks to you, He broke it, and gave it to His disciples, and said,

"TAKE, EAT: THIS IS MY BODY, WHICH IS BROKEN FOR YOU. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper He took the chalice of wine in His holy and venerable hands; and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, and said,

"DRINK THIS, ALL OF YOU: THIS IS MY BLOOD OF THE NEW COVENANT, WHICH IS POURED OUT FOR YOU AND FOR ALL, FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and His descent among the dead, proclaiming His resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting His coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

All We praise you, we bless you, We give thanks to you, And we pray to you, Lord our God.

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name. Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ. Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, all honor and glory are yours, Almighty God and Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever. *AMEN*.


THE PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS

You are also welcome to intinct the bread into the chalice if you prefer not to drink directly from the chalice. (Though, to be honest, it is fortified with extra alcohol to kill germs. If you don't drink, it the priest must, and then the announcements can get a bit entertaining after Mass.)

Good Friday April 18, 2025 * 12:00 noon



A warm welcome to all of you. As you will read further on, this is the one service of the year which has no proper beginning – therefore, we do not have the opportunity to welcome you out loud. Despite such liturgical restrictions, we hope you know that we are delighted to have you join us for the Good Friday Liturgy.

This service is a continuation from last night (Maundy Thursday) and it will conclude to-morrow night at the Great Easter Vigil. Therefore, there is neither a beginning nor an end to the service.

According to the Church's ancient tradition, in a spirit of dereliction and desolation, the sacraments are not celebrated today or to-morrow.

Solemn Silence is a significant and time-honored observance of this service, whereby we commemorate the death of our Savior.

The ecumenical Progressive Clergy of Orange County all take up the Cross and process through the church.

THE FIRST READING: Isaiah 52:13-53:12

Reader A Reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

See, my servant shall prosper; he shall be exalted and lifted up, and shall be very high. Just as there were many who were astonished at him -- so marred was his appearance, beyond human semblance, and his form beyond that of mortals -- so he shall startle many nations; kings shall shut their mouths because of him; for that which had not been told them they shall see, and that which they had not heard they shall contemplate. Who has believed what we have heard? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed? For he grew up before him like a young plant, and like a root out of dry ground; he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised, and we held him of no account. Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By a perversion of justice he was taken away. Who could have imagined his future? For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth. Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with pain. When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper. Out of his anguish he shall see light; he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge. The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he poured out himself to death, and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

Yet you are the <u>Ho</u>ly One, Enthroned upon the praises of <u>Is</u>rael. Our forefathers put their <u>trust</u> in you; They trusted, and you de<u>liv</u>ered them. They cried out to you and were de<u>liv</u>ered; They trusted in you and were not <u>put</u> to shame.

But as for me, I am a worm <u>and</u> no man, Scorned by all and despised <u>by</u> the people. All who see me laugh <u>me</u> to scorn; They curl their lips and wag their <u>heads</u> saying, "He trusted in the Lord, let him de<u>liv</u>er him; Let him rescue him, if he de<u>lights</u> in him."

Yet you are he who took me out <u>of</u> the womb, And kept me safe upon my <u>mo</u>ther's breast. I have been entrusted to you ever since <u>I</u> was born; You were my God when I was still in my <u>mo</u>ther's womb. Be not far from me for trouble <u>is</u> near, And there is <u>none</u> to help.

I am poured <u>out</u> like water, all my bones are <u>out</u> of joint; My heart within my breast is <u>melt</u>ing wax. My mouth is dried out like <u>a</u> pot-sherd, my tongue sticks to the roof of <u>my</u> mouth; And you have laid me in the dust <u>of</u> the grave.

Packs of dogs <u>close</u> me in, and gangs of evildoers circle <u>a</u>round me; They pierce my hands <u>and</u> my feet, I can count <u>all</u> my bones. They stare and gloat o<u>ver</u> me; They divide my garments among them, they cast lots for <u>my</u> clothing.

Be not far a<u>way</u> O Lord; You <u>are</u> my strength, hasten <u>to</u> help me. For kingship belongs <u>to</u> the Lord; He rules over the <u>na</u>tions. To him alone all who sleep in the earth bow <u>down</u> in worship;

All who go down to the dust fall <u>be</u>fore him. My soul shall <u>live</u> for him; my descen<u>dants</u> shall serve him; They shall be known as the Lord's <u>for</u> ever. They shall come and make known to a people yet <u>un</u>born The saving deeds that <u>he</u> has done.

THE SECOND READING: Hebrews 10:16-25

Reader A Reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

The Holy Spirit testifies saying, "This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, says the Lord: I will put my laws in their hearts, and I will write them on their minds," he also adds, "I will remember their sins and their lawless deeds no more."

Where there is forgiveness of these, there is no longer any offering for sin. Rector The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

At that time, Pilate therefore took Jesus, and scourged him. And the soldiers platted a crown of thorns, and put it on his head, and they put on him a purple robe, and said, Hail, King of the Jews! and they smote him with their hands. Pilate therefore went forth again, and saith unto them, Behold, I bring him forth to you, that ye may know that I find no fault in him. Then came Jesus forth, wearing the crown of thorns, and the purple robe. And Pilate saith unto them, Behold the man! When the chief priests therefore and officers saw him, they cried out, saying, Crucify him, crucify him. Pilate saith unto them, Take ye him, and crucify him: for I find no fault in him. The Jews answered him, We have a law, and by our law he ought to die, because he made himself the Son of God. When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he was the more afraid; And went again into the judgment hall, and saith unto Jesus, Whence art thou? But Jesus gave him no answer. Then saith Pilate unto him, Speakest thou not unto me? Knowest thou not that I have power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee? Jesus answered, Thou couldest have

no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above: therefore he that delivered me unto thee hath the greater sin. And from thenceforth Pilate sought to release him: but the Jews cried out, saying, If thou let this man go, thou art not Caesar's friend: whosoever maketh himself a king speaketh against Caesar.

(All stand.)

When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he brought Jesus forth, and sat down in the judgment seat in a place that is called the Pavement, but in the Hebrew, Gabbatha. And it was the preparation of the passover, and about the sixth hour: and he saith unto the Jews, Behold your King! But they cried out, Away with him, away with him, crucify him. Pilate saith unto them, Shall I crucify your King? The chief priests answered, We have no king but Caesar. Then delivered he him therefore unto them to be crucified. And they took Jesus, and led him away. And he bearing his cross went forth into a place called the place of a skull, which is called in the Hebrew Golgotha: Where they crucified him, and two other with him, on either side one, and Jesus in the midst. And Pilate wrote a title, and put it on the cross. And the writing was Jesus Of Nazareth The King Of The Jews. This title then read many of the Jews: for the place where Jesus was crucified was nigh to the city: and it was written in Hebrew, and Greek, and Latin. Then said the chief priests of the Jews to Pilate, Write not, The King of the Jews; but that he said, I am King of the Jews. Pilate answered, What I have written I have written. Then the soldiers, when they had crucified Jesus, took his garments, and made four parts, to every soldier a part; and also his coat: now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout. They said therefore among themselves, Let us not rend it, but cast lots for it, whose it shall be: that the scripture might be fulfilled, which saith, They parted my raiment among them, and for my vesture they did cast lots. These things therefore the soldiers did. Now there stood by the cross of Jesus his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus therefore saw his mother, and the disciple standing by, whom he loved, he saith unto his mother, Woman, behold thy son! Then saith he to the disciple, Behold thy mother! And from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home. After this, Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled, saith, I thirst. Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar: and they filled a sponge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to his mouth. When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, he said, It is finished: and he bowed his head, and gave up the ghost.

(All kneel and pause.)

The Jews therefore, because it was the preparation, that the bodies should not remain upon the cross on the sabbath day, (for that sabbath day was an high day,) besought Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. Then came the soldiers, and brake the legs of the first, and of the other which was crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus, and saw that he was dead already, they brake not his legs: But one of the soldiers with a spear pierced his side, and forthwith came there out blood and water. And he that saw it bare record, and his record is true: and he knoweth that he saith true, that ye might believe. For these things were done, that the scripture should be fulfilled, A bone of him shall not be broken.

And again another scripture saith, They shall look on him whom they pierced.



The Triduum Service will conclude at the Great Easter Vigil tomorrow night at 7:00 pm.

The Great Easter Vigil Saturday, April 19, 2025 * 7:00 pm



In accord with ancient tradition, this holy night is one of vigil for the Lord. The Great Vigil of the Resurrection is the first service of Easter day. At the same time, this service is the conclusion of the Triduum (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday) therefore, the service has no proper beginning – it is a continuation. The three days of the Triduum together make up one ongoing service. In this vigil, we wait in longing for Christ to rise from His Grave. The Service begins in the darkness and gradually builds up in light – symbolizing the passage from the darkness of the Old Testament to the revelation of Christ as the Light of the World in the New Testament and for all eternity.

Holy Baptism also belongs to this night more than any other. The practice of the Early Church was that those to be baptized would lie down under the water – just as Christ in His grave – and then, echoing the Resurrection, rise up a new and glorified person in Christ; Thus, the connotation of being re-born with Christ.

PART I: THE SERVICE OF LIGHT IN THE GARDEN OF REMEMBRANCE

All assemble outside for the blessing of the new fire.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, on this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus Christ passed over from death to life, the Church invites her members, dispersed throughout the world, to gather in vigil and prayer. As we await the risen Christ, let us meditate on God's power to save and deliver, and rejoice in his promise of eternal life, praying that through this Easter celebration God may bring to perfection in each of us the saving work he has begun.

The Blessing of the New Fire:

Rector Let us pray.

O God, through your Son you have bestowed upon your people the brightness of your light: Sanctify this new fire, and grant that in this Paschal feast we may so burn with heavenly desires, that with pure minds we may attain to the festival of everlasting light; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Therefore, dearest friends, standing in the awesome glory of this holy light, invoke with me, I ask you, the mercy of God almighty, that he, who has been pleased to number me, though unworthy, among the Levites, may pour into me his light unshadowed, that I may sing this candle's perfect praises.

On this, your night of grace, O holy Father, accept this candle, a solemn offering, the work of bees and of your servants' hands, an evening sacrifice of praise, this gift from your most holy Church. O truly blessed night, when things of heaven are wed to those of earth, and divine to the human. Therefore, O Lord, we pray you that this candle, hallowed to the honor of your name, may persevere undimmed, to overcome the darkness of this night. Receive it as a pleasing fragrance, and let it mingle with the lights of heaven.

May this flame be found still burning by the Morning Star; the one Morning Star who never sets, Christ your Son, who, coming back from death's domain, has shed his peaceful light on humanity, and lives and reigns for ever and ever.





He is not here, but has risen. ⁶Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, ⁷that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." ⁸Then they remembered his words, ⁹and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. ¹⁰Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. ¹¹But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. ¹²But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.

PART III: THE BLESSING OF THE FONT & THE VOWS OF HOLY BAPTISM

Through the Paschal mystery, dear friends, we are all buried with Christ by Baptism into His death, and raised with Him to newness of life. I call upon you, therefore, now that our Lenten observance is ended, to renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and all his works, and promised to serve God faithfully in His holy catholic Church.

Rector	[Parents and Godparents, will you be responsible for seeing that the child you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life?]
Answer	[I will, with God's help.]
Rector	[Will you by your prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ?]
Answer	[I will, with God's help.]
Rector	Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?
Answer	I renounce them.
Rector	Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God?
Answer	I renounce them.
Rector	Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God?
Answer	I renounce them.
Rector	Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept Him as your Savior?
Answer	I do.
Rector	Do you put your whole trust in His grace and love?
Answer	I do.
Rector	Do you promise to follow and obey Him as your Lord?
Answer	I do.

Rector	Will all you who witness these vows do all in your power to support this child/each other in our life in Christ?
Answer	We will!
Rector	Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

Rector	Do you believe in God the Father?
All	I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
Rector	Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?
All	I believe in Jesus Christ His only Son our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day He rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

All	I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of
	saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, + and the life everlasting.

All	I will, with God's help.
Rector	Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?
All	I will, with God's help.
Rector	Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?
All	I will, with God's help.
Rector	Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?
All	I will, with God's help.
Rector	Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of human being?
All	I will, by God's help.
Rector	Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of His resurrection and look for Him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. Amen.

THE BLESSING OF THE WATER

Rector	The Lord be with you.
All	And also with you.
Rector	Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
All	It is right to give God thanks and praise.

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through His death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in His death. By it we share in His resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into His fellowship those who come to Him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The priest inserts the Paschal Candle into the water.

Now sanctify this water, we beseech you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and forever. Amen.

Rector	<i>N</i> ., I BAPTIZE YOU IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. Amen.

	Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in you Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. Amen.

The Chrismation:

Rector We receive *N*. into the congregation of Christ's flock; and do sign him/her with the sign of the cross, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. You are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. Amen.

Rector	Receive the Light of Christ! This light is entrusted to you to be kept burning brightly. This child of yours has now been enlightened by Christ. They are to walk always as children of the light. May they keep the flame of faith alive in their hearts. When the Lord comes, may they go out to meet him with all the saints in the heavenly kingdom.
	Dearly Beloved, these brothers and sisters have now been reborn in baptism. They are now called Children of God, for so indeed they are.
	Let us welcome the newly baptized into the Church!
All	We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.]




