Please remember St Michael's in your prayers and we hope you will return to worship with us again!



THE FIRST READING: Acts 10:34-43

Reader A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

³⁴Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁶how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Christ, raised from the dead, proclaims the dawn of hope. He lives in us that we may walk in light.

Your Spirit is fire in us, your breath is power to purge our sin and warm our hearts to love.

As children of your redeeming purpose, freed by him who burst from the tomb and opened the gate of life, we offer you our praise, with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven, singing the hymn of your unending glory:

Praise and thanksgiving be to you, Lord of all, for by the Cross eternal life is ours and death is swallowed up in victory. In the first light of Easter glory broke from the tomb and changed the women's sorrow into joy.

From the Garden the mystery shone clear that he whom they had loved and lost is with us now in every place for ever.

Making himself known in the breaking of the bread, speaking peace to the fearful disciples, greeting fishermen on the shore, he renewed the promise of his presence and of new birth in the Spirit who sets the seal of freedom on your sons and daughters.

Before he was given up to suffering and death, recalling the night of Israel's release, the night in which slaves walked free, at supper with his disciples he took bread and offered you thanks.

He broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying:

"Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you."

After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying:

"Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven.

Do this in remembrance of me."

We now obey your Son's command

All We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom.

Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves a single, holy living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by your Spirit's life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptized into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end. *Amen.*

If you don't drink, it the priest must, and then the announcements can get a bit entertaining after Mass.)

Note: during the recessional hymn, the congregation is sprinkled with holy water of baptism.



THE POSTLUDE

About the "Coronation Mass" (Mass No. 15 in C major, K. 317)

The Krönungsmesse (German for Coronation Mass) (Mass No. 15 in C major, K. 317; sometimes Mass No. 16), composed in 1779, is one of the most popular of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's 17 extant settings of the Ordinary of the Mass. While it is relatively short, Bruce C. Macintyre, writing in the Cambridge Mozart Encyclopedia, classifies it as a Missa Longa, on the basis of the festal character, size of the orchestra, which includes a substantial brass section, orchestral introductions for the movements and the setting of the intonations for the Gloria and Credo.

A very warm welcome! We are delighted to have you join us. Our Mission Statement is to live out the commandment, "To love God with all our heart, and with all our soul, and with all our mind. And the second is like unto it: To love our neighbor as ourself."

Some people prefer to enter "diving in at the deep end"—for you, we have Open Baptism and Open Communion; many liturgies and classes throughout the week—all of which you are very welcome to attend. We also have many charitable programs to help the poor and needy, as well as many committees that would be delighted to welcome additional help and ideas.

Other people prefer to dip their toe in occasionally or gently. We totally understand and promise not to jump all over you like a wild St. Bernard.

Either approach is fine by us. Episcopalians are often jokingly referred to as "Catholics without the Guilt" or "God's Frozen Chosen". We prefer to offer a level of hospitality that reflects our deep belief that all guests are to be treated as if you are Christ—"entertaining angels unawares".

The "pillars" of our denomination are: Scripture, Tradition, and the Individual Conscience. We are very "traditional" in style and liturgy, but very "progressive" in our radical hospitality and non-judgmentalism.

We can promise the roof will not fall in upon your entry, nor any lightning strike you (since it hasn't struck any of us either!). We believe the Church is not a haven for "righteous" perfect people, but more like a hospital or school where broken, imperfect, or hurting people can come for help from God and a loving community—even "an Island of Misfit Toys".

Whatever your state in life—married, single, divorced; gay, straight, trans; whatever race, color, or culture; upper-class, middle, poor (God's favorite); or fancy dress or beach casual, we are not here to judge. We are here to worship, love, and help and we're just glad you are here with us.

We sincerely hope you will return and maybe even join our community if you feel so called. Whether you return or not, if there is ever anything we can do for you, please don't hesitate to let us know. Please remember us in your prayers as I can assure you you will be in ours.
