Please remember St Michael's in your prayers and we hope you will return to worship with us again!


### Flowers for the Altar


### THE SUMMARY OF THE LAW (St. Michael's "Mission Statement")

#### THE FIRST READING: Acts 2:1-21

<sup>1</sup>When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup>And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup>Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. <sup>4</sup>All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

<sup>5</sup>Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. <sup>6</sup>And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the

native language of each. <sup>7</sup>Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? <sup>8</sup>And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? <sup>9</sup>Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, <sup>10</sup>Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, <sup>11</sup>Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." <sup>12</sup>All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" <sup>13</sup>But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."





### THE RENEWAL OF PRIEST VOWS (Please stand as able.)

Sr. Warden

My brother, the Church is the family of God, the body of Christ, and the temple of the Holy Spirit. All baptized people are called to make Christ known as Savior and Lord, and to share in the renewing of his world. Now for 30 years you have been called to work as a pastor, priest, and teacher, together with your bishop and fellow presbyters, and to take your share in the councils of the Church.

and in seeking the knowledge of such things as may make you a stronger and

more able servant of the servants of Christ?

*Rector* I will.

Sr. Warden Will you endeavor so to continue to minister the Word of God and the

sacraments of the New Covenant, that the reconciling love of Christ may be

known and received?

Rector I will.

*Ir. Warden* Will you persevere in being a faithful priest to all whom you are called to serve,

laboring together with them and with your fellow priests to build up the family of

God?

*Rector* I will.

Sr. Warden Will you continue to do your best to pattern your life in accordance with the

teachings of Christ, so that you may be a wholesome example to your people?

*Rector* I will.

*Ir. Warden* Will you persevere in prayer, both in public and in private, asking God's grace,

both for yourself and for others, offering all your labors to God, through the

mediation of Jesus Christ, and in the sanctification of the Holy Spirit?

*Rector* I will.

Sr. Warden May the Lord who has given you the will to do these things give you the grace

and power to continue to perform them.

All Spirit of the Living God, we give you thanks for your Church, and for those

called to serve in word, sacrament, and love. As on the day of Pentecost, send your Spirit upon us—rekindle our hearts, renew our minds, and set us ablaze



# The Eucharistic Prayer (Scottish Liturgy 1982 Revised 2022)




Worship and praise belong to you, Author of all being. Your power sustains, your love restores, our broken world. You are unceasingly at work, from chaos bringing order and filling emptiness with life.

Christ, raised from the dead, proclaims the dawn of hope. He lives in us that we may walk in light.

Your Spirit is fire in us, your breath is power to purge our sin and warm our hearts to love.

As children of your redeeming purpose, freed by him who burst from the tomb and opened the gate of life, we offer you our praise, with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven, singing the hymn of your unending glory:



Praise and thanksgiving be to you, Lord of all, for by the Cross eternal life is ours and death is swallowed up in victory. In the first light of Easter glory broke from the tomb and changed the women's sorrow into joy.

From the Garden the mystery shone clear that he whom they had loved and lost is with us now in every place for ever.

Making himself known in the breaking of the bread, speaking peace to the fearful disciples, greeting fishermen on the shore, he renewed the promise of his presence and of new birth in the Spirit who sets the seal of freedom on your sons and daughters.

Before he was given up to suffering and death, recalling the night of Israel's release, the night in which slaves walked free, at supper with his disciples he took bread and offered you thanks.

He broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying:

"Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you."

After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying:

"Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven.

Do this in remembrance of me."

We now obey your Son's command

All We recall his blessed passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension; and we look for the coming of his Kingdom.

Made one with him, we offer you these gifts and with them ourselves a single, holy living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by your Spirit's life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptized into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles, and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end. *Amen.*


power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

If you don't drink it the priest must, and then the announcements can get a bit entertaining after Mass.)

# Requiem Choral Evensong Honoring Dr. Burton Karson Saturday, June 21 at 5:00 pm

Please join us for a Requiem Choral Evensong in loving memory of Dr. Burton Karson, held on Saturday, June 21 at 5:00 pm at St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church. Dr. Karson was a cherished member of the St. Michael's family and served faithfully as Organist-Choirmaster Emeritus. A lifelong musician, educator, and cultural leader, his influence reached far beyond our parish—through his decades of teaching at California State University, Fullerton, his leadership in founding and directing the Corona del Mar Baroque Music Festival, and his work with institutions such as the Philharmonic Society of Orange County and the Segerstrom Center for the Arts. A graduate of the University of Southern California, Dr. Karson earned his doctorate in music in 1964 and went on to shape generations of students, musicians, and concertgoers through his scholarship, performances, and pre-concert lectures for ensembles including the Los Angeles Philharmonic and Carmel Bach Festival. Choral Evensong is a traditional Anglican service of evening prayer, offered through scripture, prayer, and song. Most of the liturgy is sung by the choir, creating a reflective and peaceful atmosphere that invites contemplation and reverence—especially fitting as we honor Burton's life through the sacred music he loved and shared so generously. We invite all who knew and admired Burton students, colleagues, family, and friends—to come together in this service of music and remembrance, giving thanks for the life of a man who inspired so many through his unwavering devotion to beauty, education, and sacred music. All are welcome. A reception will follow.

# Excavating Jesus: How Recent Archaeology is Revealing Amazing New Insights About Our Faith (In person or on Zoom)

June 28, 2025 at 9:30 am – 4 pm

The Holy Land is a region of many claims about Jesus. Archaeology is the careful science that affirms the actual evidence that Biblical stories actually took place. The latest discoveries have opened our eyes to deeper insights about life at the time of Our Lord, and can help you understand and treasure the Gospels even more. Father Dave Heney has led 19 archaeological tours of the Holy Land and will share how archaeology is expanding our understanding of Jesus and his world.
