To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting

his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

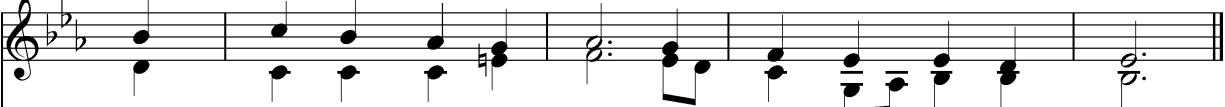

Introduction to Stewardship Season

Stewardship season has arrived! God's grace has guided us through another year, and we are truly grateful for the parish community at St. Michaels and All Angels. Our congregation is composed of generous and thoughtful individuals who consistently step up to support our church.

Through your willingness and quiet dedication, you have contributed both time and money, helping to preserve the beauty of our worship services, the magnificence of our music, the warmth of our fellowship, and the well-being of our broader community.

Facing Challenges and Embracing Opportunities

This year has not been without its financial challenges for our parish. However, through the diligent work of the Finance Committee and Vestry, we have continued to host The Gordon School on our campus and have welcomed The Seashore Academy this fall. These leases are a vital revenue stream that helps us plan our next budget accordingly.

Financial Stewardship and Campus Ministries

The Vestry remains committed to implementing a zero-based budget for campus ministries, relying on pledges and in-kind donations to support these efforts. In addition to the valuable rental income from the two schools, our campus continues to benefit from relationships with Verizon and Roger's Gardens, both of which help to further reduce our deficit. Additional sources of support include Parish Center Donations, increased weekly plate offerings, and ongoing pledges. You can be assured that Fr. Shane, the Finance Committee, and the Vestry are steadfast in their responsibility to steward the resources entrusted to them.
