"How Far Is it to Bethlehem"

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE BIRTH OF CHRIST

Celebrant

The twenty-fifth day of December. In the five thousand one hundred and ninety-ninth year of the creation of the world from the time when God in the beginning created the heavens and the earth; the two thousand nine hundred and fifty-seventh year after the flood; the two thousand and fifteenth year from the birth of Abraham; the one thousand five hundred and tenth year from Moses and the going forth of the people of Israel from Egypt; the one thousand and thirty-second year from David's being anointed king; in the sixty-fifth week according to the prophecy of Daniel; in the one hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad; the seven hundred and fifty-second year from the foundation of the city of Rome; the forty second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus; the whole world being at peace, in the sixth age of the world, Jesus Christ the eternal God and Son of the eternal Father, desiring to sanctify the world by his most merciful coming, being conceived by the Holy Spirit, and nine months having passed since his conception, was born in Bethlehem of Judea of the Virgin Mary, being made flesh. The Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the flesh.

¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see — I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, (+) and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Let us pray for an end to violence and the establishment of a lasting peace in the Holy Land, in the Ukraine, here at home, and all places ravaged by darkness and

violence. Let us pray for the traumatized, those held hostage, the hungry, the grieving, the dying, and all who are working to relieve the suffering of others, to find peaceful modes of dialogue and defend human dignity.

Where there is darkness;

All Let there be Light.

Intercessor

Almighty God, from whom all thoughts of truth and peace proceed, kindle we pray you in every heart, the true love of peace and guide with your cure and peaceable wisdom those who take council for the nations of the earth, that in tranquility your kingdom may go forward until the earth is filled with the knowledge of your love.

Where there is darkness;

All Let there be Light.

Intercessor

We commend to your compassion and mercy, O God, all those in our community, or among our families and parish, our friends and neighbors, who are in need this night. We particularly remember those who are sleeping on the streets, those experiencing anxiety and despair. We pray for the lonely and the anxious. We pray for all who are searching for meaning, guidance, forgiveness, and love.

Where there is darkness;

All Let there be Light.

Finally, we pray for all who have died and are now upon that far distant shore with you, O Lord. As we remember all those who used to be with us on this night, help us to realize that, as you did not lose them in giving them to us, so we do not lose them by their return to you, because what is yours is ours also if we are yours. Remind us that love is immortal and death is only a horizon, and a horizon is nothing but a limit of our sight. Cleanse our eyes that we may see more clearly. Draw us closer to yourself so that we may know ourselves to be nearer to our loved ones who are now with you.



Glory and thanksgiving be to you, most loving Father. In Jesus the Messiah you have come to us, and lived for a time among us, that we might for ever live with you. In the manger at Bethlehem, in his flight to Egypt, and as the carpenter's son, the Only-begotten bent low to meet us.
